#### Bible:

Abbreviated Book Chapter:Verse(s) (Version Name)

#### Conference Paper:

Author First Name Last Name, "Title of the Paper" (paper presentation, Name of Conference, Location of Conference, Month Day, Year of conference).

#### Interview:

First name Last name of interviewee (title/identifying information if needed), interviewed by First name Last name, Month day, year of interview, City, State (if applicable).

**Journal Article:**

First name Last name, "Article Title," *Journal Title* volume number, issue number (Month year of publication): Page-page, DOI or URL.
